

The "Un-usual" Suspects in Spinal Pain

In everyday practice, when working with a new or established patient, our focus can sometimes become narrow on what is causing our patient's problem. The temptation to become "lazy minded" is always there and easy to take. And why wouldn't we? After all, about 71% of patients with neck or low back pain will either have a facet or disc mediated pain; treat both, combined with therapy aimed at the soft tissues and you almost have all your bases covered. But what about the 5-10% of cases that seem to be unresponsive to conservative treatment or even more invasive interventions. In this newsletter I would like to briefly touch on a few lesser known pain generators of the spine. Identifying them and explaining them to our patients with targeted treatment options is essential for any expert physician.

Vertebral end plate

The cartilaginous vertebral endplate is thought to be one of the weakest links of the vertebral motion segment (two vertebrae and the disc between them). The end plate is highly innervated by the basivertebral nerve (BVN) which branches off the sinuvertebral nerve (SVN). Injuries to the endplate typically involve the same loading mechanisms that cause disc injury, and are in fact often precipitated by pressure from the disc onto the cartilage. Typical patient presentation is of pain along the midline of the spine worsened by stationary positions and transitions. This can occur with or without apparent disc injury. We can conclude injury to the endplate when MR imaging demonstrates Modic changes or Schmorles nodes, although the presence of these findings is not essential for diagnosis.




Thecal Sac Compression

The anterior aspect of the thecal sac is more highly innervated (by the sinuvertebral nerve) than the posterior side. Pain from the anterior theca is often triggered by either physical compression or inflammatory irritation (discussed below) from a central disc protrusion. We can pick this up on physical examination when a straight leg raise test is positive for pain in the lower back but does not reproduce leg pain. Recent studies suggest that this maneuver performed in the supine position does not significantly irritate a small lumbar central disc herniation as previously thought but causes stretching of the thecal sac, known conveniently as the "thecal tension sign"

Inflammatory Chemical Mediators

Acute injury to the spinal tissue often brings about an inflammatory cascade. This is followed by release of chemical mediators such as inflammatory cytokines, TNF-, neurotropins and interlukens. These chemicals play a role in amplifying the pain signal coming from the injured tissue as well as other structures around it. For example, a disc herniation can be "leaky" of these inflammatory chemicals and cause irritation of the nerve roots and subsequent radicular pain in the absence of true nerve compression. In fact the same can occur in an injured and leaky facet joint, producing radicular symptoms even in the absence of disc injury!



Granulation Tissue

Ok, so we are talking about the disc again here, BUT...in this case we are not discussing acute injury to the disc itself but rather the changes in the disc tissue that follow. The occurrence of disc injuries typically takes route from the inside out. This means the nucleus pulposus tears through the inner layers of the annulus and makes its way outwards. Pain is not perceived until the tear reaches the outer onethird of the annulus which is innervated by nerve fibers. The healing process of this tear involves "plugging" it with granulation tissue which does not exhibit the properties of full tensile collagen making it weaker and more susceptible to reinjury. More importantly, the deposition of granular tissue comes with deeper infiltration

of the outer nerves into the disc, and increased expression of nociceptors, making the disc more sensitive and recording pain more frequently.

The Importance of Evaluating the Median Atlantoaxial Joint

The spinal manipulation treatment protocol that is ubiquitous and unique amongst the chiropractic profession mandates that careful evaluation of spinal stability be performed. The median atlantoaxial joint is a target site for many conditions. Several of these can cause changes that can result in spinal instability and, for that reason, is the topic of discussion.

The median atlantoaxial joint is a complex region of anatomy that needs to be assessed during the routine evaluation of cervical spine images. This joint consists of the odontoid process (dens), the posterior aspect of the anterior arch of the atlas, associated ligaments, and synovial tissue. It is this anatomy that predisposes this region to instability. The transverse ligament tightly holds the odontoid process against the posterior portion of the anterior arch thereby establishing a potential site of weakness in cases of trauma. Interposed between the anterior surface of the odontoid and the anterior arch of the atlas is a synovial membrane and interposed between the posterior surface of the odontoid process and the transverse ligament is another synovial membrane. The synovial anatomy creates the potential for erosion of the osseous structures and/or ligaments, and therefore instability of the joint, in cases of inflammatory arthropathies or other causes of soft tissue inflammation.

However, despite the atlantoaxial joint complexity, the determination of stability is relatively simple. The space between the anterior surface of the odontoid process and the posterior portion of the anterior arch of the atlas is called the anterior atlantodens interval or ADI. On the lateral view of the cervical spine, taken at a 72-inch focal film distance, a space that

exceeds 3.5mm in the adult or 5.0 mm in a child in either the neutral position or in flexion indicates instability. Instability is almost always associated with fracture of the odontoid whereas isolated instability without fracture indicates an abnormal transverse ligament related to trauma, inflammation, or congenital anomaly. This includes rheumatoid arthritis, ankylosing spondylitis, tonsillitis and pharyngitis that leads to ligament laxity due to hyperemia. As a matter of fact many of the inflammatory arthropathies are capable of causing instability. Within the congenital category, Down syndrome is often associated with an unstable atlantoaxial joint.

So, in practical terms, what does this mean? Prior to manipulation of the cervical spine, a patient with a history of cervical spine trauma, known or suspected inflammatory arthropathy, infection or certain congenital anomalies, should be screened with a lateral view of the cervical spine in the neutral position and in flexion to evaluate the ADI. Routine radiographic examination without flexion views may not be sufficient for evaluating the ADI prior to manipulative therapy. An important caveat: do not perform the lateral view in flexion until the neutral lateral is screened.

Keep an eye on the ADI if you want to improve patient care, minimize your liability, promote a successful practice and enhance your professional standing in the health care system.



New Laws Championed by the FCA Win Legislative Approval

Tallahassee – Two new laws promoted this session by the FCA won the unanimous support of the full Senate on Tuesday of this week, heading next to the Governor's desk for his consideration. Once approved, a new statute will correct difficulties some DC students have experienced in getting licensed by virtue of having earned their undergraduate degree from colleges outside the U.S., while a second law creates clarification in Florida statutes that dry needling procedures are within the scope of chiropractic for DCs practicing in Florida.

An amendment added in the House providing guidelines for education, training, and certification DCs would be required to complete before performing dry needling procedures was agreed to by the Senate before the upper

chamber gave their final approval to the new laws by a 40-0 vote. The effective date of the measures is "upon becoming law," meaning they take effect on the date the Governor signs the new legislation or alternately allows it to become law without his signature on the 15th day after receipt.
